Form D must be completed to use the following benefits: VA Educational benefits, National Guard Tuition Waiver, or the State of CT Veterans Tuition Waiver.

October Veteran of the Month

Sam Pevsner

The office of Veterans Affairs & Military Programs (VAMP) at UConn is pleased to honor Sam Pevsner as our Veteran of the Month for October 2019. Sam currently serves as a Peer Mentor for the Veterans Section of the FYE (First Year Experience) Class this semester. He is pursuing a degree in the Engineering program and is involved with the Veteran Students Organization (VSO) on-campus.

Sam served in the Navy for 5 years as an electronics technician (navigation) on submarines.

During that time, he was on the USS Mississippi, then PCU Mississippi. Thus, Sam was part of the commissioning crew, also known as a plank owner, and they completed systems turnover for the Navy from Electric Boat and took the boat on initial sea trials. It was a stressful, but incredible experience that not many people get the chance to be a part of.

Having left the Navy, Sam was concerned about going from active duty to being a full time student. He graduated high school early to pursue music before he joined the Navy, and he thought he lacked a lot of educational skills required for college. So, Sam first completed one semester at Three Rivers Community College before coming to UConn. It wasn't until Sam started taking classes that he realized the training he received in the military helped prepare him and acquire better skills for learning. Also, being an electronics technician going into electrical engineering didn't hurt either.

After coming to UConn Sam was amazed at the network and resources for veterans. Having the Oasis and the weekly bar night (coordinated by the VSO) really helped Sam to get involved and fostered good relationships instead of just commuting in for classes and leaving. That was definitely one of the things that helped Sam the most in transitioning back to civilian life and he encourages everyone to come out to bar night, even if they don't drink, simply for the social aspect. Sam shares, *"the Veteran Organization and resources are a large part of what I enjoy about going to school at UConn. I think it is unique what we have here."*
